Something wicked this way comes! Marblehead High School's drama department is about to put on their next performance, but this time under the direction of a new face. In his first year of teaching at the school, current Theatre Arts instructor Nicholas Gould has moved from the classroom to the stage, where he has been spreading his knowledge of dramatics to the cast of his new production of William Shakespeare's *Macbeth*. The play stars sophomores Benjamin Harney as the title role and Olivia Gentes as Lady Macbeth. With the last few weeks of tech rehearsal closing in on the actors, I was fortunate enough to interview the director to learn more about the show and the people behind it.

## Q: Have you had any other experience directing high school students?

A: I've been directing high school students since 2009, when I directed *Sweeney Todd* for a community theatre near my home in Texas. Since then, most of my directing experience has been with teens and college age students.

## Q: Are there any other ways you help the actors understand their parts?

A: We talk about scenes and monologues as we come across them in the script. Character development is a partnership between the actor and the director. They know their character better than I do, but I've got the overall vision of the play in my head.

### Q: Should the audience expect anything new from this performance?

A: I think they should expect the same high quality work they're used to seeing from Marblehead students. But there is an element that hasn't been featured much before, though I'd like to keep it a surprise.

# Q: Is there anyone you would like to thank for assisting in the production of the play?

A: First and foremost, my assistant director, Sarah Sontz. She's been keeping me on track and has helped shape the production into what it is. And of course, thanks goes to all the cast and their families for the time and effort put in so far.

Mr. Gould is very excited to share the work he and all the actors have put into the production. The show will be held in the MHS Theatre for a total of three performances: Thursday, May 28, and Saturday, May 30 at 7:30 p.m., and one matinee on Sunday, May 31 at 2:30 p.m. Tickets are \$10 at the door.

#### Taylor Swift: "Bad Blood"

This past Sunday, May 17th, Swift kicked off the 2015 Billboard Music Awards with the premiere of her much anticipated music video, "Bad Blood." The video is the fourth released from her most recent album, 1989. However, this video is almost the polar opposite of the bright colors and peppy dancing seen in past videos, such as "Shake it Off."
